

# The Rector's Visions

As a priest, one of the great joys and daunting responsibilities of my ministry is to be with people in times of crisis. I visit people worn by medical issues or isolated because of their age. I spend time among those who are struggling with addictions or mental illness or other chronic illness. With the church's discretionary fund, I am regularly called to be with people in financial crisis often brought on by other, sometimes tragic, issues in their lives. And I am with people when they are near death and with families after someone they love has died.

At those times of crisis, people often experience great clarity of vision. They see their lives and human life with new eyes. Priorities change, things once valued no longer seem important and things too often ignored are now the main concern. Sometimes, of course, given a crisis, we ignore it. Often my job at a deathbed is to say what no one wants to hear: you are dying. Faced with addiction, someone has to say: you are powerless before the alcohol or the pills; you need help. Struggling with age, someone must hold up the mirror and say: you can't do that anymore, you need to move to a care facility, you need a will and final directives. In all these cases, I get to bring not only the hard truths, but also the love of God, the care of God's people, and my own love, too. And, of course, prayer with God.

Nowadays, the crisis is pandemic. It is everywhere and everyone. Our regular ways of busy-ness have been sidelined. Our comfortable habits have been disrupted. And there are new priorities. We are seeing our daily lives with different eyes. Some of us want to pretend it's not so. Some of us want to be in control of things we cannot control. The struggle for all of us is real and hard. And all of us are called to be priests for one another.

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. (1 Peter 2:9)

It is our calling as people of God to speak the truth in these dark days in order to bring the marvelous light of the Gospel to others and to the world. There are people struggling in this crisis. Truly, to some degree every one of us is struggling in this crisis. And we, as God's people, are called to be present in ministry (maybe six feet away, with a mask, by phone, or virtually!). We are called to speak the words that must be heard. Sometimes they are hard words that no one wants to hear.



Sometimes they are words of love and care and support. Often, perhaps, they are both. (Continued on page 2)

Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful. (Colossians 3:14-15)

What do Christian people do when faced with a crisis? They depend on God, pull together, speak the truth ... and they love in harmony. And they look for reasons to be grateful.

One of the things that happens to families in the crisis of grief is that they either pull together in support of one another or they begin to break apart, bicker over inheritance, or even avoid one another as a way of avoiding the pain. In this crisis of pandemic, I have seen each of these tactics among us as the people of God who are Kingston. Here at Kingston, we are blessed with a vestry leadership that has pulled together in God's love to work together in harmony in amazing ways! In the world, and sadly especially in our beloved country, I see so many people "choosing sides and bickering over inheritance." As people of God, our task is to bring the love of God that unites us in truth and harmony. Harmony does not mean we all sing the same note (believe or vote the same way). As a matter of fact, you can't sing in unison and have harmony. Harmony requires different notes side by side. And perhaps love does also. We do not love one another because we think exactly the same way. We love each other not in spite of our differences, but in many ways because of them.

We will continue to live in this pandemic crisis for some time to come. We are adding to that an election cycle that appears to be pulling us apart as Americans. It could pull us apart as Christians, and perhaps even as members of the Body of Christ at Kingston. May we always remember the big things – that God is so much bigger than this election, that we are called to love our enemies, that it is our unity as people created in the image of God that is far more primary than which box we check on election day.

Jesus Christ has called together people of all nations and ages and backgrounds into one Kingdom to sing together a harmony that is God's. We are a part of that miracle sound. Sing in your own voice. And listen, always listen, for God's voice. Sing for love of God and neighbor. And together, because of our differences, we will find the way from darkness to light, through cross and crisis to new birth.

- Mary Chapman was elected Lay Delegate to the Diocesan Convention and Paul Gibson the Alternate.
- Chris Wolfe was hired to repair the flashing on the back of the Parish House that was torn off by a storm a few years ago and to fix the water leak in the storage shed.
- The vestry voted to spend \$984.00 from the organ fund for the arch molding for the Christ Church organ case.
- Nina Allen will be moving to Charlotte, NC to remain close to her family, but will serve her term through the end of the year.
- Mary Kathryn Diggs proposed different ways that we can have our Fall Fair online. An email will be sent to the church discussing plans, to include an online auction, and asking for volunteers. We plan to sell BBQ and Brunswick Stew as well. We hope to hold the auction during the week of October 10-17.
- Tom Reed, Treasurer, continues to praise our parish for sustaining their offerings during the pandemic. The 2020 distribution request for endowments made by the Endowment Committee was approved by the vestry.
- There will be a diocesan wide online worship service the Sunday of Labor Day weekend, September 6th.
- The Diocesan Convention will be held online by Zoom in November. Fr. Gary suggested Jon Lewis as the youth delegate from the Upper Tidewater Region and the vestry approved.

# Junior Wardens' Report

The organ is fully installed at Kingston Chapel and the last thing to do is cover the chamber openings with an acoustic cloth. We have a target date of the end of September to have the case built and the organ at Christ Church installed completely.

## **Remembering Mae Montague**



From Kate Taylor: Mae was born in Philadelphia, she was the only child of Betty and Bill Vaughn. Early in her childhood, they moved to Norfolk where she, graduated from Norfolk High School. She then attended William and Mary. While there, she met Payne Montague; she then left college and married Payne.

They moved to Pennsylvania, where she volunteered at a local hospital. She and Kate Taylor's mother, Jane Smith, were college room mates, became best of friends and she even moved next to Jane in Pennsylvania. That is where she helped to raise Kate. Mae had no children of her own, but adopted a son. Her love of medicine led her to attend nursing school, where she graduated as an LPN. Mae worked in a family practice office until she and "Monte" retired to Virginia.

Monte passed away in 2000; she then married Bill Walters in December of 2001. She and Bill enjoyed boating and traveling. They had a sail boat, then an Albin power boat and lastly a trawler that they travelled on from Florida. She and Bill were on the inaugural voyage of the Queen Mary II, which sailed across the Atlantic Ocean. She was an avid dog lover and enjoyed bird watching. She and Bill loved volunteering at the animal rescue, for Meals on Wheels, for Mathews Market Days, and at her churches, both in Pennsylvania and here at Kingston Parish.

She had a wonderful sense of humor and cherished visits from the company of her many friends. There is nothing that she wouldn't do to help anyone. If someone moved into the neighborhood, she is the one who would show up with a homemade cake to welcome them.

Her Christian faith was a major part of her life, and she enjoyed listening to classical music and the old hymns. She passed away July 24, 2020, while living at the Gloucester House with Bill. She was 93 years old.

## **Remembering Martha Anne King**

Excerpts from Martha Anne's obituary: Martha Anne King (Smith), 73, of Hallieford, VA passed away, Saturday, July 18, 2020 after a warrior's battle with Cancer. She was born in Kansas City, MO on August 17, 1946 to the late Bradford and June Smith. Martha Anne is survived by her loving husband of 50 years, Terence Michael King, two daughters, Tracey (m. Eric Barrett) and Virginia (m. Chris Leggett); four grandchildren, Ryan, Josh, Brennan and Elizabeth June, and her brother, Hilton "Butch" Smith and sister-in-law, Judy.

Martha Anne grew up in Alexandria, VA., graduating top of her class from Groveton HS in 1964. She attended Lynchburg College on a swim and dive scholarship, graduating with honors in 1968 as an English major. Following graduation, she was offered a programming position with IBM. Not only did she take the offer, she negotiated her own salary, which was quite an accomplishment for a woman in the late1960's.

Her position at IBM took her to New Jersey where through her brother, Butch, she met her future husband, Terry. They married on November 28, 1969. Martha Anne's career took them back to the DC area in the early 70s, where she worked within the federal contracting field, retiring in 2007.

In 1979 Martha Anne and Terry began their endeavor as their girls' biggest fans on the sideline of a soccer field, in the bleachers of a field hockey tournament, enjoying a school talent show, editing graduation speeches, or producing the world's best elementary school haunted house (with the best witch costume ever), and volunteering countless hours with the PTA and other organizations.

Upon retirement, Martha Anne and Terry came to the Rivah full-time. Terry's diagnosis with Parkinson's disease placed

MAK into a new role: caregiver. Fulfilling her oath to support each other in sickness and health, MAK worked tirelessly with the VA to ensure Terry would receive his full entitlement, which would provide for his care for the rest of his life.

During her retirement years in Mathews MAK discovered her true self, undergoing a metamorphosis into an accomplished writer and visual artist. The women and men at the Chesapeake Bay Writer's Guild, National League of American Pen Women, Bay School Community Arts Center, Rappahannock Art League, Kingston Parish, her cherished "Booked for Lunch" Club, and "Soup Group" inspired Martha Anne to continue her explorations in literature, art and life.

Her written works were published and heard at open mics. Her love of painting took her to Italy and other exotic locations. She exhibited her art work in galleries across Virginia, entered and won art shows, and never stopped learning her craft. She leaves behind an extensive portfolio of "to be finished" pieces.

MAK was overjoyed to become "Grandma" with the birth of her four grandchildren, each embodying strengths of their beloved grandmother.

Throughout MAKs life, she used her power and intelligence to make this world a better place. Her friends and family describe MAK as an inspiration, joyful, spirited, strong, and intelligent. Her strength, determination, and love of life continued throughout her life, never wavering while she waged war against her cancer for two and a half years. MAK's "Nymph Army" of friends and relatives held her up when she could not. When treatments failed and no other options arose, save for Riverside Hospice, she chose to surrender peacefully in her beloved River house, within the gallery of her beautiful works, with her adoring daughters by her side.

<u>From Marti Bowen</u>: I have never known anyone like Martha Anne. The light and love she emanated attracted us and enhanced our visions. Her creativity inspired awe and she shared with her heart generous and genuine mentor, helper, encourager. We loved her kindness, boldness, courage, absolute positivity, and lovely wicked sense of humor. Mary Ann, thank you for your beautiful tribute that brought tears and the gnome story that brought laughter - a gift from MAK? How could we ever doubt it?

From Mary Pope: I came to know Martha Anne when enjoying "Paint Night" at the Bay School. Later we would see each other at community events and church lectures. I truly regret I didn't have the time to know her better! She was such a positive person, a talented artist, and a joy to be around. Always a twinkle in her eye. She was an inspiration to all that knew her.

An Excerpt from Mary Ann Carr's tribute: We all know that Martha Anne had a sparkle in her eyes and a playfulness that brought delight to everyone. And she was a little mischievous. Apparently, she couldn't resist engaging in play one last time. Standing beside her bed in the stillness and silence of death, her daughters were surprised by the sound of voices. Glancing around, they noticed the light on the TV receiver. Like the TV, it had been off for hours. But now, mysteriously, it was on. Tracey and Ginny thought simultaneously, "A message from Mom." Turning on the TV to see what was playing, they were both surprised and delighted to see "Sherlock Gnomes," a kid's program. In this show, two garden gnomes were trying to figure out how to climb a fence in order to get to the other side. A playful message from Martha Anne? Perhaps. I can see her now, laughing, filled with delight at the thought of those gnomes. I can also imagine her being overjoyed with the sights on the other side of that fence, eager for all the amazing things she will experience. May she be joyous!

From Nina Allen: Martha Anne King was a gifted writer, a talented artist, a beautiful flower arranger with a whimsical and fun personality. Favorite memories? 1) Working with her on one of the last annual Mathews Garden Club's flower shows where I did the easy stuff and she did all the hard computer stuff so effectively and efficiently with skill and a smile. 2) At the last Halloween party organized by PATH Martha Anne came as an iridescent butterfly with black tights, shimmering wings and full butterfly makeup on her face, complete with antennae. She was stunning! Everything she did, she did beautifully. I will miss the friendship of my friend across Queens Creek.
